

#### From the Ministry Team

#### Dear Friends,

I am writing this in early April for the May edition of Trident, which is yet another casualty of the Coronavirus in that it can only be published online. For me, today is Palm Sunday, the beginning of Holy Week, when Christians enter with Jesus into Jerusalem and walk with him his last days, to his death on a cross. My palm cross from last year reminds me that the crowds who welcomed Jesus into the holy city, waving palm branches, were baying for his blood by the following Friday. But, as Peter Davis reminded us in the April edition of Trident, Good Friday gave way to Easter Day, sorrow turned to joy and 'the Easter message gives us hope in a bewildering world and hope to face the uncertainties of the future.' Prophetic words indeed as we live through these strange, sad and frightening times.

The empty cross reminds us that death by crucifixion was not the end of Jesus and that love conquers all. And haven't we seen that in these last weeks and months? Hospital staff of all ranks risking their own lives to care for others; those in other essential services and industries carrying on to keep us all going; world communities sharing information together to fight this deadly virus; and neighbours reaching out in love to help each other.

When someone asked Jesus 'Who is my neighbour?' he told the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke's Gospel chapter 10 verses 25 to 37). It's the story of a man who was mugged and left for dead as he travelled the dangerous road from Jerusalem to Jericho, which winds through gorges in deserted places. Three people came along, but the only one who stopped to help was a Samaritan – a foreigner. When Jesus had finished his story, he turned the tables on his questioner and asked <u>him</u> 'Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?' He replied, 'The one who showed him mercy'; and Jesus said, 'Go and do likewise.' Both Jews and Christians have the commandment: 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' Jesus added to this the 'Great Commandment' to 'Love one another as I have loved you.' We give thanks for all those who are showing love for their neighbours during this crisis.

#### Christian Aid Week 10-16 May 2020

Christian Aid Week each year gives us the opportunity to show compassion to our neighbours, not just in these villages or even in this country, but throughout the world. This special week each year is the main fund-raiser for this charity, enabling it to bring emergency and development aid to some of the poorest communities in the world, whatever their religious beliefs. Its motivation is Christian, but this week enables many other kind-hearted people to participate. Unfortunately, the Coronavirus has put paid to the usual envelope deliveries. door-to-door collections, Big Brekkies and other fund-raising events that we had planned for 2020.

Last year, together, we raised £2,500 in our three villages, moved by hearing of the dangers for pregnant women in Sierra Leone. Christian Aid was able to build many new health centres and has supported community savings groups to help pay for transport to their nearest clinic. This year, the campaign was to focus on Kenya, where poor farmers have been pushed to the brink of survival by the climate crisis. They have often had to struggle against severe droughts, but these are now more frequent and more intense. Women and children are forced to make long and dangerous journeys to find water, walking on average 8km/5 miles a day. Christian Aid is supporting work to catch and save rainwater when it does fall. A sand dam, for example, is the cheapest method. It needs little maintenance and will last for 50 years, providing a reliable source of water all year round for up to 1,000 people.

But, of course, it is Covid-19 that is occupying everyone at the moment. Christian Aid has experience of working with the Ebola crisis and will build on this experience should this spread to poorer countries. They say:

'If infection rates start to develop as they are in Europe, then people in poorer countries will be hit even harder. Many are already living with reduced health resilience because of extreme poverty, or in overcrowded humanitarian camps and in countries which do not have the healthcare infrastructures needed to combat widespread disease. We will be working on the ground to help prepare communities to limit the impact of Covid-19.'

We also need to remember that this is a global pandemic and we are all in this together. If Covid-19 sweeps through poorer countries, - when restrictions on travel are lifted in the West, there is the danger that it will all start up again here. Only together can we beat this virus.

It would be great if we could raise another £2500 this year to support Christian Aid in this vital work. We cannot make this easy for you by knocking on your door, and we cannot keep a tally of what you give, but PLEASE

Download for free. More resources for prayer and on-line services can be found on the Benefice website (http://www.efl-churches.org/worship-resources/). I pray that knowing that we are held together in prayer will bring comfort during this time when we are not able to meet in our churches.

I realise that many who are on their own at this time may be finding it difficult not to be able to go into our churches so I am trying to bring everyone together by producing services that we can all read at a set time in our homes. I have also produced some material on YouTube for those who would like to listen as well as join in the liturgy. I plan to continue with this pattern as far as possible until we are once more able to join together in public worship. I know that many of you are using other technology to come together to worship which is absolutely wonderful, keep up the good work.

As we do not know when these restrictions will be lifted, it is more important than ever to appreciate those things which are live giving. Just looking around at our beautiful surroundings; the wonderful gift of friendship that we have been rediscovering as we have more time; being able to spend time with our families, even if this is sometimes at a distance via Skype or Facetime; caring for one another. Thank you all for your faithfulness in prayer, stay safe, God bless.

All that is familiar and normal is suddenly changing . The things that gave you security are gone . You possibly feel vulnerable , under threat and in danger .

Can I encourage you that whilst Jesus never promised an easy journey he did promise " Never to leave you or forsake you" (Hebrews 13v5). The disciples found this out. Jesus was still asleep In the boat, he was not troubled by his environment as he knew it was in subjection to him. The disciples woke him and Jesus met their need by calming the storm and then challenging their faith (Luke 8 v24 to 25).

Can I urge you today to take your fears and doubts to our Lord in prayer. He will listen and calm the storm of your heart . He will reveal himself to you . He has promised us all that as you put your trust in him you will "reach the other side"



#### **Interpreting the Darent Valley Landscape**

With all of us being advised to take our exercise close to home, I wondered if Trident readers might like to refer to an interpretive walk that I wrote back in 2012 for the Royal Geographic Society's online series www.discoveringbritain.org.

In it I relate about the farmed landscape as you walk along the Darent Valley between Shoreham and Eynsford railway stations (or vice versa if starting from Eynsford!).

The described route starts in Shoreham, looping up along 'the Terrace' footpath to gain panoramic valley views before returning to pick up the river path. Heading downstream it passes Castle Farm before continuing on and linking to various historical points in Lullingstone and Eynsford village.

This walk is titled *"From Hops to Lavender"* and includes 21 stopping points from where I describe how the valley's local geology and geography has influenced land use and farming enterprises during past decades and over the centuries. Additional topics embraced include the artist Samuel Palmer, the river Darent, Shoreham's chalk cross, flint stones, Lullingstone Castle silk, transport developments and the Eynsford tree mnemonic.

Even if you are unable to get out yourself or if we are restricted from such activity by government, you may enjoy the text as a reminder of the beauty, diversity and history of our valley.

Farningham Parish Council met via a video link on Wednesday, 1<sup>st</sup> April 2020, and present were seven parish councillors, the Clerk, Jane Gray, Sevenoaks District Councillor Philip McGarvey and Kent County Councillor Roger Gough.

#### **Covid-19 virus pandemic:**

The government lockdown in the face of this outbreak forced postponement of our Annual Parish Meeting organised for 1<sup>st</sup> April 2020 and the requirement for our monthly Council Meeting was held via the Zoom website. The next Parish Council meeting on Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> May will be also be held virtually via Zoom and the Annual Parish Meeting will precede it at 7.00pm. Members of the public are asked to send any questions or comments prior to the meetings to the Clerk or alternatively contact the Clerk to get a login to join the either meeting; details will be placed on the noticeboard at the Farningham Village Hall and on the website. The virus outbreak has also forced the temporary closure of the car park at Farningham Woods and the play area in Oliver Crescent while Friends of Farningham meets have been postponed until further notice.

#### Support network:

It is very encouraging to see the network of support that has grown following the virus outbreak. A volunteer group of Farningham and Evnsford residents has been formed and our local businesses have also reported an upsurge of customers. Farningham Butchers have had many more customers, some not seen for a number of years, and they are also operating a home delivery service. Many expressions of grateful thanks have been aired by residents and the same appreciation has been offered to Rafferty's local shop and Norman's Butchers in Evnsford. Riverside Tea Rooms has also made deliveries to residents and community spirit is undoubtedly uplifted by these expressions of generosity. 'Cook' (via Sevenoaks District Council) has offered to provide a weekly cooked meal for elderly and vulnerable residents and though this is not up and running yet, it will be shortly. Please contact the Clerk if you wish to be put on the list or can suggest a suitable resident. When we are finally out of the grip of this deadly virus it can only be hoped that local residents will remember these kind thoughts and deeds and support our local shops – please use them or lose them. Our Clerk, Jane Gray, is one of the volunteers available to assist those in need and her contact details are above.

#### **Housing issues:**

Sevenoaks District Council's Chief Officer, People and Places, Sarah Robson has issued guidelines to residents concerned at their housing situation in the

wake of any financial difficulties caused by the Covid-19 outbreak. The Government has announced that private and social landlords will not be able to evict tenants; there is further information on the Sevenoaks District Council website <a href="https://www.sevenoaks.gov.uk/info/20001/housing/512/coronavirus\_and\_housing">https://www.sevenoaks.gov.uk/info/20001/housing/512/coronavirus\_and\_housing</a> or contact direct by telephone 01732 227000.

#### Kent County Council:

Cllr Roger Gough reported that a 'Kent Together' 24-hour support network has also been formed in the face of the virus pandemic and can be contacted via the internet on the KCC site or by telephone on 03000 419292. The resurfacing of Cinder Path, between Oliver Crescent and the High Street, has been completed and further investigation into the flooding in Eynsford Road has revealed the drainage system that runs under private properties may have been tampered with during building operations in the past.

#### Dog waste bins:

We have decided to remove the five dog waste bins from the village and now ask residents to deposit their bagged dog waste into the Sevenoaks Council street litter bins. Notice was received from KCC that dog waste now needs to be mixed with other rubbish and so Councillors made the decision to remove the dog waste bins and install new litter bins at the High Street end of Sparepenny Lane and at the Farningham end of Millfield. We learnt that dog waste and items put in the village litter bins are collectively treated as contaminated waste and all of this is incinerated thus having separate bins is unnecessary. We will monitor the situation to see if more litter bins are required. Unfortunately, our volunteer litter pickers continue to discover quite large numbers of discarded plastic bags full of dog waste, particularly on the Darent Valley walk along Sparepenny Lane and on the river walk. This is a nationwide scourge akin to fly tipping and very sad to see. There are also some problems at the moment because Sevenoaks cannot empty the litter bins as frequently as usual. It should be noted that the use of these bins for household waste is not permitted by SDC but some residents ignore this and overflowing bins become even more of an issue.

#### **Farningham Woods:**

The Parish Council have released funds for remedial work to improve security, the drainage and surface of the car park at the woods.

#### **Bonfires:**

Everyone is reminded not to light bonfires as it is unneighbourly.

#### Shand Hall:

The Hall was transferred to St. Peter and St. Paul's Parochial Church Council on 9<sup>th</sup> March 2020 as a community building for Farningham.

#### **Casual Vacancy:**

The Parish Council would like to thank Guy Williams for his valuable contribution to the Council; he will be much missed. Accordingly, there is now a vacancy for a Parish Councillor. Please contact the Clerk (contact details above) with a few details about yourself if you wish to be considered for Co-option.

#### Sevenoaks District Council - Grass Cutting

Sevenoaks District Council's maintenance team have been redeployed helping with refuse collections and we have been informed the greens in Alban and Oliver Crescents will not be cut for the foreseeable future. Sevenoaks District Council is the only Council in Kent to maintain a weekly refuse and recycling collection. Most other Councils alternate between the two; the Parish Council is therefore happy to support this. A very public-spirited parishioner in Alban Crescent has cut both greens with his own lawn mower and the Parish Council would like to record grateful thanks. The Parish Council has stepped in and arranged for a contractor to cut the grass in Oliver Crescent.

Our next meeting Parish Council meeting will be on Wednesday, 6<sup>th</sup> May 2020; please see first paragraph for details. 

We thought it might be of benefit to send you some ideas of activities you can do at home with the children. These have all come from the team so we hope that you will give some of them a try. Remember to follow your child's lead and go with it!

#### Inside

Playdough or slime are always winners. Here's a link to a recipe for playdough with items you may have at home <u>https://pagingfunmums.com/2013/11/01/soft-as-a-cloud-playdoughusing-only-2-ingredients</u>.

Why not add spices, cocoa powder or natural resources you find in the garden or out and about on your once a day exercise. Sticks, cones, leaves all add to the creativity that your child natural possesses. You'll be amazed at what they create. Gloop - this is simply cornflour and water. You will need a container, such as a washing-up bowl. Simply add water to the cornflour and let them explore its properties. When mixed it feels wet. Grab a handful and take it out of the water, it dries out again. Magic!

Self-help skills - this is the perfect time to work on those self-help skills with your child. There's no rush to be anywhere, so use this opportunity to help them learn how to dress and undress; even those tricky zips and buttons can be achievable with lots of patience and practice. Put on their own shoes, wellies, etc. Learn how to open their own packages at lunchtime. How to use a spoon, or even a knife and fork. Pour their own drinks. Clean away after themselves. Why not let them do some washing-up. Household chores are not a bore to young children, they can be really fun. Let them use the dustpan and brush, clean the table. You will be so glad that they are able to do these things and the teachers at primary school will be very grateful!

Food - if your children keep asking for snacks all the time because they are bored, why not make a tuck shop list with healthy things on it such as carrots, apples, etc. These are generally cheaper than unhealthy snacks such as crisps and biscuits. You could give them a budget to spend each day, using monopoly or real money. It will help them to begin to understand that things have to be paid for and that once the money has gone, its gone!

#### ACE (Association of Camphin and Eynsford

As you can imagine there has been no choice but to cancel all events for the twinning association in the near future. You start to think about what is important about twinning with Camphin. Yes visits are important and as soon as this crisis is over we will be planning for the visit from the French group hopefully



as planned in September. For me at the moment it is more important to speak to Bruno and hear that he and his family are safe and as far as I know so are our other friends in Camphin.

Having had to recognise that I am of a certain age with underlying health issues I need to stay at home - this is difficult to accept. In times of stress I find cooking a most relaxing occupation. So for this article I thought I would share a typical dish from the Camphin area. Camphin is very close to the Belgian border and this is reflected in the cuisine of the area. So my choice of a recipe to share is **Carbon-nade Flamande - Beef cooked in beer.** virtually all ingredients available locally.

#### Ingredients to serve 4 - 6

1 1/4 kg stewing beef
 400ml Belgian beer or dark ale
 3 garlic cloves crushed
 2 bay leaves
 3 tbsp plain flour seasoned with salt and pepper
 2 - 3 tbsp olive oil
 250g diced pancetta
 2 carrots
 2 onions
 1 leek
 1 tbsp tomato purée
 350 ml beef stock
 Bay leaves if available



#### Method

Marinate beef overnight in the ale with bay leaves and garlic. Reserve the marinade. Pat meat dry and toss in seasoned flour

Heat 2tbsp oil in large flameproof casserole. Fry beef in batches until browned. Remove meat and set aside

Lower heat to medium and fry pancetta until crisp and golden. Scoop out pancetta and set aside with beef

preheat oven to fan 140c / conventional 160c / gas3. tip carrots, onions, leek into the casserole and fry. Takes about 12 minutes. spoon in tomato purée. cook for 2 minutes

#### Sydney Smith 1771 - 1845

Famous for his wit, charm and good nature, he once advised against contact with "poetry, dramatic representation (except comedy), serious novels, melancholy sentimental people, and everything likely to excite feeling or emotion not ending in active benevolence." He suggested that a friend afflicted with low moods should take "short views of human life – not further than dinner or tea."

In times of trouble, a "magic soupçon" of cheer gives delight. Salad is not normally at the top of our list of comfort food, but Smith's recipe is brimming with sustenance for body and spirit.



# History Corner – Jan Wilkes

Leslie Bryant was born on 23<sup>rd</sup> December 1920 and lived at No 1 Elizabeth Cottages. He attended school in Eynsford. By 1939 he was still living in Elizabeth Cottages and was a piano repairer. He later moved to Plymouth getting married in 1946. He spent the rest of his long life in Plymouth and died in 2004. He penned his recollections of Eynsford from when he was a boy and this was published in Trident July 1992 (*These are Leslie's memories I have not altered them in any way*)

#### A PREMIER VILLAGE

"Go up to Mr Gee's now get me eight pounds of preserving sugar and go Now!" I went at once, one didn't argue with my grandmother, a stern yet kindly lady, Superintendent of the Sunday School, member of the Parish Council and one who did not brook any form of resistance to her wishes. Mr. Gee was in fact Peter's Gee's grandfather and owned the main village store and post office at the end of Willow Terrace where the shop still stands. Eynsford in the 1920's was, I suppose, the perfect example of a truly English village – a mix of the famous in both the practical and literary sense and some extremely technical ability. In the cottage next to Mumm's the grocers – opposite

the Castle Hotel – lived Leslie Hore-Belisha who introduced the Belisha Beacon. Up on Eynsford Hill with a view of the village which must have been second to none, Sir Arthur Mee wrote his many books and publishes the Children's Newspaper. I still have a copy of his '1940 Our Finest Hour' on the fly leaf of which it says 'to my friend Mrs Bryant, guardian of the

village children' a reference to her work in the Sunday School.

Parsonage Farm – where R & G Edwards are – was an active farm with huge barns and a stackyard full of grain stacks. At the appropriate time each year Bruce Dolling's steam tractor and thresher would arrive in the stackyard and all five or six stacks of grain would be threshed. If we are lucky, we young boys would be allowed to climb up into the engine. If we were not so fortunate, we armed ourselves with large sticks and

endeavoured to kill the rats which scampered from the disintegrating stacks. Bruce Dolling's engines and threshing machines were kept up Priory Lane where the Fire Station – now a residence – once stood.

Between Harry Mills, the butcher and the Five Bells was a fascinating little sweets and sundries shop run by Mr & Mrs Cyril Pinkstone. Cyril was a very kindly man – to the point that small children who hadn't quite enough money with them were often allowed to take the sweets away.

Opposite Mr Pinkstone was Eynsford's star attractions - so far as industry went -

The Gibson's Iron Foundry, where some of the best manhole and drain covers were made and supplied to the authorities all over the UK. Plough and field rollers were also made, and the blast furnace was a spectacle to behold, particularly on winter nights when a myriad of sparks and the glow of the furnace lit the night sky. The then new Water Works was constructed at this time with two enormous diesel engines with fly-wheels weighing 80 tons geared the huge pumps. Mr Rolfe was the chief engineer and lived with his family on the site. His assistant engineer was a Mr Eves who constructed a miniature steam traction engine, making every part himself in his backyard shed. It was a superb engine and caused great excitement among the village children. At fetes and charity events it would pull several adults or children on short rides with obvious benefit to the charity concerned.

One could go on and on: the schools – the primary school Headmistress was a Miss Lily Bradshaw – a lovely talented lady who had as her assistant an absolute disciplinarian with a voice like rolling thunder – one Miss Townsend. We were all scared stiff of her and it wasn't until later years that we appreciated fully just what a great teacher she was. You didn't just learn or else – you learned!


The Senior School's headmaster was a Mr Leslie Hillier, also a great believer in absolute discipline but the results he achieved were a credit to the school.

There was so much more but to sum it all up – a lovely village – at that time  $4^{th}$  in the official list of 'beauty spots of England' – a friendly village with much generosity available when anyone needed help – oh yes, and an inbuilt determinations to beat Farningham at anything they attempted – football, cricket,

church and civil events etc. which I have to confess we didn't always manage.

PS I still remember the sack of broken biscuits outside Mun n's shop at 1d per pound.

We have welcomed the change in the weather but already plants are wilting and will need watering but we must remember water is precious .

Due to the lockdown South and South East in Bloom have created a Desk Top judging for this year . The information can be a presentation of annotated photographs of horticultural , environmental and community work dating back to last July and submitted by 31st July .We are fortunate to have Chris Lewington , who joined us three years ago , to compile our entry .


We are lucky, especially in these difficult times, to live in beautiful countryside, many of us with gardens in which we can work and relax. Spring has sprung all around us. The birds are nesting. Brimstone, Peacock, Red Admiral and Tortoiseshell butterflies will have overwintered as hibernating adults and can be seen daily. The Orange Tip butterfly overwinters as a chrysalis but have emerged and feed on the garlic mustard. Pipistrelle bats have been watched in flight to catch insects about 8 pm in Pollyhaugh. A buzzard has been seen above Millfield. None planned for April.



**National Overview.** The weather was generally unsettled with westerly winds during the first half, and after a cool showery start it turned milder. The weather turned more settled after mid-month and there was a spell of widespread dry sunny weather with warm days and cool nights. The mean temperature for March was provisionally 0.2°C above the long-term average, and it was generally warmer than average by day but a little colder than average by night. Rainfall was 77% of average. Sunshine was 146% of average, making it the 8th sunniest March in a series from 1929.

<u>In Eynsford</u> we had 50mm (2"), which is just above average over 15 days. Virtually all the rain fell in the first 15 days then the second half of the month was dry and cold with winds from the north and several frosts.

# Bus Times from April 2020

As a result of the current travel restrictions, from 14 April, Go Coach will be suspending all their bus services in the Sevenoaks area, including Route 2 serving Eynsford. In their place they are planning to introduce an "on demand" service marketed as "go2" whereby, with the use of a mobile phone app or by contacting Go Coach by phone on 01732 463964 you can order a bus to collect you from a local stop and take you to Swanley or Sevenoaks (or points in between). It is planned to offer this service during the course of the present emergency situation from 6 am to 6 pm on Mondays to Fridays and 8 am to 6 pm on Saturdays, at the same cost as normal bus fares, Concessionary bus passes will also be accepted.

They plan to use smaller buses than usual and limit the number of people on each bus to a maximum of 10 so that social distancing can be maintained. The mobile app was not available at the time of writing but to register you are asked to email Go Coach at <u>office@go2now.co.uk</u>.

From the same date, the 429 bus route from West Kingsdown, through Farningham to Swanley and Dartford will operate an amended Saturday service (generally once every 2 hours) every week-day. The first bus from Farningham to Swanley and Dartford is at 08.37 followed by the 10.37, then 12.37 (to Swanley only), then 14.37 and 16.37. Buses return from Dartford, Home Gardens at 09.30, 11.30, 15.30 and 17.30 and from Swanley, Bartholomew Way, at 10.00, 12.00, 14.00, 16.00 and 18,00. There will be no services on Sundays or Bank Holidays.

Bus and train services should only be used for travel to and from work by key workers, to shop for food, or for medical supplies or appointments.

Bus services continue to operate between Dartford and Darent Valley Hospital including the 477 bus route, operated by Arriva, on weekdays from Swanley to Dartford, Darent Valley Hospital and Bluewater at 07.42, 8.57, 10.12 and every one and a quarter hours until 21.27; returning from Darent Valley Hospital every one and a quarter hours from 06.08 until 21.08. A Sunday service is provided every 90 minutes from Swanley at 09.10 until 18.10, returning from Darent Valley Hospital at 10.08 and every 90 minutes until 19.08.

Trains continue to run from Eynsford and Swanley stations. Although the ticket office at Eynsford is now closed, the ticket machine, accepting only credit or debit cards, is being maintained. Generally a Sunday service will operate every day from Eynsford to Swanley, Denmark Hill (for Kings College Hospital) and London, Blackfriars at 08.41 and every 30 minutes until 22.41, and to Sevenoaks on week-days at 06.05, 07.05, 08.05 and then every 30 minutes until 23.05. On Sundays the first train to Sevenoaks is at 08.05 then every 30 minutes until 00.35. These times are subject to last minute changes, so it is best to check with www.nationalrail.co.uk before travelling. *David Toser*
