From the Ministry Team

As I sat looking at the garden this morning I realised that we are coming to the time of year where we see hopeful signs of Spring and yet listening to the weather forecast I know that Winter could still have a sting in its tail. At the same time, we are all still unsure about the future too. Brexit is over but there are still uncertainties, there is the global economy and the situation in America. We believe that lockdown is beginning to have an effect and we are all looking forward to receiving our vaccine. So we try to look positively to the future and yet we are not sure if there might be further bad news round the corner.

How then do we approach life with all its uncertainties? We could take a lead from Celtic Christianity which closely followed the rhythms and seasons of natural life especially the seasonal year. Let us remember before God those who have no home through poverty or persecution in the British Isles and further abroad and pray for the agencies who seek to help them.

We can also remember the words of the English mystic, Julian of Norwich, 'God loved us before he made us; and his love has never diminished and never shall' and 'all shall be well, all shall be well, and all manner of things shall be well.'

So let us look forward with confidence in the knowledge that God never leaves us but accompanies us through all of our life's journey (whether we are aware of God or not). And let this inspire us to encourage and support each other and have a concern for those further afield who need our support and prayers.

As a ministry team, we pray that God will bless you with His peace and an awareness of His Presence in the weeks and months ahead whatever they might have in store. *Peter Davis*

St Martin's - Eco Church!

Bee happy!

I know several people in Eynsford who keep bees, and I'm sure there are others in our three villages. The honey that bees produce in their hives has been valued for thousands of years. It is a rich food and also has healing properties. Perhaps most important is that bees pollinate about 70% of the food we grow. Today, however, pure, natural honey is under threat. So much honey is adulterated with other products like rice or artificial sweeteners; it may have been boiled to keep it runny, consequently removing its health-giving properties; and it may be the product of more than one country. It means we can now buy a jar of 'honey' really cheaply, and this is pushing down the price for poor farmers in developing countries. This discourages bee-keeping, and the reduction in pollination has an impact on food production.

<u>What can we do about it?</u> We can try whenever possible to buy our honey from local hobbyist beekeepers. This will encourage them to continue with this fascinating hobby and the honey we buy will contain nutritious trace elements. Locally bought honey may also help to treat allergies such as hay-fever if taken over a long period. We can avoid buying cheap, low-quality honey. We should read the packaging information carefully to see where the honey comes from and if it is 100% natural. I recently saw two jars of honey on a supermarket shelf that looked very similar, being sold under the same name. One cost about $\pounds 2$, the other about $\pounds 4$. The more expensive jar contained 'organic honey', was certified by the Soil Association, and had a logo: 'Protecting bees and beekeepers. Hives for lives.'

We can also grow a wide variety of flowers in our gardens to provide pollen and nectar for the bees for much of the year. The best varieties are open flowers for easy access; and bees are also drawn to purple flowers. Most bees hibernate in the coldest winter months and need food when they emerge in the spring. So why not plant spring bulbs, such as crocuses, grape hyacinths and alliums, which between them should flower from late February to late May.

My attention was drawn to this problem in an article in the Autumn 2020 magazine of a charity I support, called Shared Interest. This charity enables people to invest money to support Fairtrade projects around the world. Shared Interest currently works with six Fairtrade honey organisations in Latin America and Africa. It knows that working with bee-keepers is in everyone's interest. *Jan Thompson* (for St. Martin's Eco Church)

Although the end of the Covid pandemic is in sight, things are set to get worse before they get better. There's a well-known verse from the Psalms which is extremely relevant for the times in which we live.

God is our refuge and strength, an everpresent help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear,



though the earth give-way and the mountains fall into the heart of the sea, though its waters roar and foam and the mountains quake with their surging. Psalm 46:1-3

Those who seek to walk in God's ways can be confident that he is there to help in times of trouble. The Psalmist speaks of his decision not to fear when mountains quake and seas roar. At such times, God will be a source of strength, a refuge and ever-present help.

His help comes in a variety of forms. Sometimes he sends someone to us with helpful advice and encouragement. Sometimes he sends someone to provide practical help. Sometimes his invisible hand of providence causes our circumstances to change. Sometimes he gives us wisdom and savvy to take measures ourselves.

Christians are not exempt from sufferings, challenges and danger. God does not always intervene to *remove* troubles. Sometimes he gives us special help to keep going and to persevere. This is uncomfortable and often painful. The psalmist declares that God is ever-present and that is true even if we do not *feel* it, indeed especially when we do not feel it. At these times he is at work behind the scenes and it only becomes clearer later what was going on.

Biblical faith is not primarily about what we believe but about trust in a person who is all knowing, all powerful and all loving and who has the final say in what happens to his creation.

At Eynsford Baptist Church, we think we can see where things are heading for us, and it will be good. But it is going to be a while longer before we see our church building used once more for regular worship and community activities. Meanwhile we trust God who is our ever-present help and we will not fear.

Farningham Parish Council met via a video link on Wednesday, 13th January 2021, and present were six parish councillors (including Sevenoaks District Councillor Philip McGarvey), Kent County Councillor Roger Gough and the Clerk Amanda Barlow.

Covid Vaccination Centres:

An internet link is available for the latest news on the vaccination programme for COVD-19 virus and this is <u>www.kentandmedwayccg.nhs.uk</u> Sevenoaks District Council Health and Communities Manager Kelly Webb issues regular updates on the pandemic and we will continue to post these on our Facebook page. For those without internet access, Kelly Webb can be contacted by telephone, 01732 227474.

Electric Vehicle Charging point:

The Parish Council's proposal to take advantage of a KCC grant for the installation of an Electric Vehicle charging point was discussed again. The grant is dependent upon the installation being placed on community land, and we proposed that the installation be in the car park belonging to Farningham Parish Council at Farningham Village Hall. We polled all Parishioners on our circulation list last September and a significant majority of respondents were in favour of the project. The Village Hall Committee is unfortunately not in favour, however, and very reluctantly therefore we feel it inappropriate to continue with the project. We will however continue to look for future similar opportunities that may be viable.

Council tax:

As indicated at our last meeting, there will be no increase in the parish council share of Council Tax for 2021/22 and a Band D household will remain unchanged at £70.17 each.

Updates from Kent County Council:

KCC, with considerable support from Army Logistics, have been able to make impressive strides into a programme to test people across the county who may be asymptomatic with the COVID-19 virus. Over 50,000 people had been tested by the second week in January, an average of 17,000 a week. Recent heavy rain had put pressure on the newly installed flood prevention scheme in Eynsford Road and Cllr Gough confirmed the continued huge improvement. While the proposed traffic survey in the High Street has been de-

Happy New Year to everyone from the EVS Committee which we hope it can and will be though I doubt it will feel particularly reliable until vaccines are accepted as safe and trusted particularly with Covid-19 now evolving mutations itself to survive. Braeside surgery has told me jabs of the first, Pfizer vaccine need to be kept in serious cold storage and so can only done at a hospital; there is more hope for the newer Oxford/AZ brand which will be done at a local hub, maybe in Swanley, but have no idea when that might begin; NHS powers dictate, just to add to the chaos and uncertainty we could do without; some of us may know better as I believe one or two have had theirs already. The strict timetable of process seems to apply and we can take some comfort from the fact that we have each been graded as to where we each fit in (eg I am in batch 4); we will all get a letter when its our turn. I wonder when the full programme will have been rolled out, and whether we are locked down in Tier 5 for the long haul pending some certainty. How long will it take to achieve "herd immunity" when we might all feel more like breathing a sigh of relief, or breathing at all? One thing seems certain, that it will all take much longer than we expect or are being led to expect.

Does the race between infection and injection need to be global to be fully effective? Given protection from some of the diseases we take for granted are still not wholly eradicated worldwide (eg polio, TB) perhaps it is inevitable eventually that the more affluent and sophisticated western world will look after its own to ensure survival to manage a much needed economic recovery. Perhaps we should be taking bets on when any of the village clubs, societies and pastimes will be open again; no time soon is mine.

Nevertheless, life goes on and these are the important EVS dates for your brand, spanking new, empty 2021 diaries:

The Discussion on CCTV in Eynsford

During last year when we had periods of lockdown, Riverside saw an increased number of people who gathered to enjoy the sunshine and river. This, unfortunately, led to some incidents of antisocial behaviour and other misdemeanours which, understandably, caused concern to some residents within Eynsford.

An option was put forward to the Council for consideration of installing CCTV on Riverside and this led to a working party looking into the merits of installing such a system. Information considered included crime data from Police; cost of installing and maintaining such a system; the benefits that this could have to residents; and the wider picture of safety in the village.

We looked at crime statistics over the last three years across the whole village and it revealed that although during a very short time this year, within the first lockdown, where there was an increase in antisocial behaviour at Riverside, crime in that area is very low. Crime figures showed that generally, offences are committed across the whole village and to cover all areas with CCTV would be a cost that would be extensive to the Parish Council. A concentration of crime around the Eynsford Station area and cameras are already in place at the station and are used, when required, to investigate crimes.

Considering the data, the costs and the benefits to residents from installing a system on Riverside, a decision has been reached not to go forward with CCTV.

However, the wider issue of crime in the village has been considered. Information was sought from residents, who fed into the working group, around their concerns and these included:

- Littering throughout the village
- Antisocial behaviour
- · Lack of public toilets
- Use of disposable BBQ's charring land and causing smoke
- Parking along the road at Riverside causing traffic problems
- Lack of social distancing across the village
- Use of the water for Horses being walked and 4x4 vehicles

The working group are now taking forward the following recommendations to help towards the safety and wellbeing of residents of Eynsford:

• The development of a robust crime awareness programme. Working with the Police the group will be developing information and guidance for the appropriate reporting of crime to ensure figures are up to date and trends highlighted. This way evidence can be recorded and used to improve policing in the vil-

With lockdown back in force, to help stop the spread of Covid-19, the Parish Council are still conducting Zoom meetings twice a month discussing Planning applications, Highways, Recreation and Community & Environment matters.

The Council has recently reviewed the road markings and signage around the Bower Lane/High Street junction to see what ideas we could put forward to Kent Highways to make this junction safer. It was found that the road markings are extremely worn, causing some drivers to drive down the wrong side Bower Lane at the bottom. As a result, the Council have requested Kent Highways re-instate all the white road markings around the junction.

The Parish Council continues to work with volunteers from Eynsford & Farningham who provide help and support to vulnerable residents shielding or selfisolating. We offer our thanks to everyone involved for their kindness, hard work and dedication.

I had hoped that 2021 would bring back some sense of normality, but alas that is not the case. In January, it was announced that Sevenoaks had the 4th highest rate of Covid-19 infection in Kent. I'm hoping that by the time this goes to print the figures will have improved significantly and that many more residents will have received the vaccination that should finally help turn the tide.

With the opening of the 'no symptom' testing centre at Swanley, more people will have the opportunity to be tested. Those that are asymptomatic but do test positive, knowing they are carriers and can self-isolate protecting others. Together we can beat this.

We recently received a letter from a Brownie from Eynsford & Farningham Brownies, asking if recycling bins could be installed throughout the village. Previous requests to Sevenoaks District Council have been unsuccessful, supporting their poor record on recycling, however, our Green Team are working towards a greener Eynsford, so with the help of inspired young people like our brownie friends, we will approach Sevenoaks again to convince them of the urgent need for these services.

We continue to deliver quality education and care to those children who are still attending, and I cannot thank our team of Early Years Educators enough for their diligence, good humour, resilience, and general loveliness, as they continue to provide the best possible start to our young children's education story.

The RSPB Big Garden Bird Watch

How to take part:

- 1. **Pick a time** You can choose any hour between 29 and 31 January. So whether you're an early bird or a night owl, you can still take part.
- 2. Tell us what you see Count the birds you see in your garden or from your balcony*. Ignore any birds that are still in flight. To avoid double-counting, just record the highest number of each bird species you see at any one time not a running total. *This year our advice is to take part in the safety of your own home. This could include a birdwatch from your window if you overlook a green space or courtyard.
- 3. Submit your resultsOnline: You can submit your results online at rspb.org.uk/birdwatch from 29 January until 19 February. By post: If you'd rather send your results by post, you can download a submission form. Please post your results before 15 February.

Every count is important so, if you don't see anything, please still submit your result. Finding out which birds don't visit your area is as important as understanding those which do!

See our website for printable bird ID sheets to help you, or posters you can display to show you're taking part.

Thanks to people like you taking part in the Big Garden Birdwatch, we now have over 40 years of data and this has helped increase our understanding of the challenges faced by wildlife.

What do birds eat?

There are lots of different bird foods available, including mixes for bird feeders and bird tables, as well as for ground feeding:

- Blackbirds mostly feed on the ground and will eat anything from fatty nibbles to mealworms
- Blue tits and great tits use a feeder, eating seeds as well as suet and peanuts
- Finches, including chaffinches and greenfinches, use both a feeder and a bird table, and they love sunflower hearts
- Look for good quality bird food those that don't include 'fillers' such as dried peas and beans that birds rarely eat. You'll find some great mixes in our shop
- You can put out leftovers such as some bread, fruit cake, dried fruit, unsalted nuts, or fruit such as apples and pears. Don't use anything mouldy or salty though, and if you have a dog don't put out dried fruit – vine fruits such as raisins can be toxic to them.

History Corner - Jan Wilkes

The Parish Magazine continues to be a source village information. Over 100 years ago the magazine was full of articles about far flung places, gardening tips, recipes, poems, quizzes, short stores and of course information about the village, sometimes very blunt and to the point. The following are from the Farningham magazine.

October 1895 – In the present day it is considered a compliment to be asked to stand sponsor for a child at its baptism; but from the following entry in 1752 it appears that on one occasion a fee was necessary: 'Paid Godfather and Godmother that stood for Mary Stansbury's child 2s.' Not only did the parish provide Godfathers and Godmothers but sometimes Overseers interested themselves in matrimonial affairs, as in 1810 they paid 9s. for a gold wedding ring for a woman whom it

was desirable to get married, and the Vestry paid the costs of the wedding.

July 1901 – The vicar has thought well to suspend for a while the Catechising (to teach the principals of Christian dogma, discipline, and ethics by means of questions and answers) in the Church on Sunday afternoon, and instead to take the children in schools. He is sorry to have to say that he has been led to this change by The Pocock family who lived in Farningham the sad irreverence of the children at

the services. The cause of this irreverence he little doubts, springs from the habitu-

al absence of parents from all and every of the

Church's Services, thus setting their children no example of the sacredness of God's House or Day, from the growing want of parental control.

And lastly piece taken from the Vicar's letter in May magazine 1896, after he had been on holiday on the shores of the Mediterranean. 'We saw many beautiful places, and passed through some grand old cities, which possessed many attractions, but on returning home to the Vicarage and seeing the green fields around and the trees budding forth in all the freshness of spring, and above all the dear old Church of Eynsford, we felt we had visited no place in which we would prefer to live than in our own village and amongst our own people.

Eynsford Green Team Survey Response

<u>Thank you</u>

Many thanks to all those residents who completed our survey, "How Can Eynsford Be Greener". We carried out the survey to canvass local opinion, to find out what residents would like us to do and help us decide which environmental schemes we should implement.

We received 98 responses (online and paper), which equates to about 12% of households in the parish. This is an encouraging response and 72% of those respondents stated that they felt it was "very important" that Eynsford Parish Council/EGT tries to tackle environmental issues within the parish.

Recycling

From analysing what we currently recycle as a village we are doing well on glass and clothes. We are looking at ways we can facilitate more recycling within the village. We will contact and lobby Sevenoaks District Council on improving recycling options throughout the whole district.



Ideas and suggestions

We had lots of positive responses to our suggestions. 85% of respondents wanted to see more bee and wildlife planting on parish council land. We are already implementing wildlife planting and are aiming to launch a wildflower pot/hanging basket initiative for everyone to get involved with this spring, details to follow next month.

70% of respondents would like more recycling points in the village for different items and as mentioned above we will work on this.





We were thrilled to hear residents' comments/ideas, and these included the following:

Recycle bins next to existing rubbish bins for visiting public to recycle litter Communal compost bins

Co-operative for bulk purchase of electricity

Hydro power from the river

We will review all the suggestions put forward.

Electric cars and charging points

We had an interesting response to the electric car question with 45% of respondents stating that they already own an electric car or within the next 5 years they plan to buy one. Of those that do or plan to have an electric car, 20% would not be able to charge on their own property, therefore many villagers will need access to a public charge point. As there is a developing need for public charge points EGT are reviewing possible locations and investigating the available grants. After 2030 all new cars will have to be electric and EGT will help the village prepare for this.

Renewable Energy

Whilst not everyone was keen on the idea of a community solar panel field or a wind turbine the Government has committed to bring all greenhouse gas emissions to net zero by 2050. As part of this commitment, the Government have set

up the Rural Community Energy Fund, which is a £10 million programme to support rural communities in England to develop renewable energy projects. There are many inspiring projects taking place throughout the country using this fund. These projects not only provide clean energy but also give social and economic benefits to the local community. This is an area we will continue to investigate.

<u> 10-Year Plan</u>

The responses to the survey have given EGT the information and impetus to prepare a 10-year plan of what we aim to achieve. We will publish this plan later in the year. Thank you to all those respondents who offered to help EGT or help with various projects, we will be in touch soon. We will work with village groups where relevant as we ap-

preciate many groups already have eco policies or wish to do more for the environment. Do not forget we regularly post articles on

Eynsford in Bloom

We have not held a work party since I wrote the last report in December. However, some maintenance is needed. Heavy rain has washed soil away at the ford again. The strong winds blew down one of the four cotoneaster trees on Four Tree Island at the station. We are unlikely to replace it as this is happening too frequently. A small shrub and perennials will be planted in the Spring.



The apple tree and Rosa Rugosa have been pruned at the station . Sticks have been removed from the triangle where the primrose will flower soon . Leaves and weeds have been removed from one border behind the boat . Just three inches down the soil is still completely dry .

Hopefully the recent frosts will help control garden pests and diseases The winter flowering cherry trees in many gardens have been flowering profusely since November . In St. Martins Church yard the aconites are showing their bright yellow colour . The first snowdrops are opening and the hellebores are in flower .Birds and small mammals will be sheltering and feeding in our garden borders .Please break the ice on water in a bird bath or other drinking sites, eg puddles .

During the next four weeks we must decide whether or not to enter the annual South and South East in Bloom event .Judging will be during one day in the three weeks from 28th June to 16th July . Four alternative ways of judging , dependant on the Government restrictions at the time , have been prepared . The judging gives extra purpose for us to keep the village as clean and attractive as possible but requires considerable time and effort from our volunteers to maintain past standards .

Our own gardens are wonderful wildlife sanctuaries and Eynsford is a wildlife oasis surrounded by arable land . The hedgerows and River Darent are wild-life corridors . We are privileged to live in and enjoy this beautiful valley .

Due to the Covid lockdown we will not be holding our regular work parties until the regulations are relaxed . Our priority is to keep safe .

Wheelchair Rugby

In 2006, during a business trip down under, I had the opportunity to watch Great Britain play a couple of matches in the Wheelchair Rugby World Championship in Christchurch, New Zealand. Little did I know the impact that trip was going to have on the next 14 years of my life!

The sport at that time was very small here in the UK, comprising seven clubs and, at a guess, 70 or 80 players (all of whom would have been tetraplegic, having suffered life changing spinal injuries). Eventually I found myself on the Board of the charity that runs the sport, becoming Chair in 2010; effectively by default, when my predecessor decided to focus on being selected for the GB squad for the London 2012 Paralympics.

The ten years since have been a bit of a roller coaster. At the grass roots, the game expanded materially, and we now have a domestic league comprising three divisions, over 20 clubs, and more than 350 players. Programmes were established for young players, as well as in spinal units and military rehabilitation centres. We also developed a new variant of the game, which now provides for wheelchair rugby to be played by people with greater functionality than is allowed by the Paralympic version.

At the GB elite level, December 2016 became a moment of heartbreak. Despite coming fifth in Rio (equalling our World ranking at that time), UK Sport announced that they would not be renewing our elite level funding. This not only placed a huge question mark over our ability to maintain a competitive GB team, but also raised questions over the future of the grass roots with the GB team being the profile that allowed us to attract sponsors and volunteers. The next four years saw us embark on an intense and challenging campaign to find other sources of funding – and, remarkably, this was not only achieved, but the elite team even managed to improve our world ranking.

Wheelchair Rugby here in the UK only functions due to the phenomenal efforts of a small and varied team of people. I have been fortunate to work with some truly inspirational individuals, be they players, family, volunteers, sponsors, our small but talented band of employees, and of course my fellow Board members. When I first became involved it was because I wanted to "give something back". However, truth be known, wheelchair rugby has given me far more than I have ever given it. It has been a privilege to be involved! *Kevin Aitchison*

<u>January – Happy New Year, Janus</u>

January the first month of the new year, where did last year go? A strange unexpected year that seems to have flashed by. Good news from a gardening front though as apparently in the lockdowns a whole new crop of return-



ee and new gardeners have picked up their shears and dibblers to start growing. I hope if you are in that group you've enjoyed your gardening year, especially the pleasures of sitting enjoying the flowers you have grown or eating the results of your hard work.

An enjoyable January task will be sitting down with a pad and pencil, lots of seed and plant catalogues to plan 2021's planting and produce. There is so much choice and variety, aren't we lucky?

January named for Janus the two faced Roman god who looks forward and back. That certainly applies for gardeners at this time of year. A quiet month, looking back at what went well – potatoes, tomatoes (didn't everyone have a glut !), aubergines, peppers and chillies, varieties of which I will be re-planting in 2021. Recognising also what did not succeed and deciding where to try something different e.g. 3 years of failing to grow sweet potatoes, lots of foliage but no tubers mean it's butternut squash instead this year.

I like to try something different each year either a new vegetable or new variety. This year I am trying ginger, avocado indoors and some different varieties of beans and peas out as last years pods weren't stunning . Try planting herbs in pots on a sunny window sill to brighten a room I'm still picking window sill to-matoes from last year.

On the practical side January is tidy and clean month ... Check and clean the greenhouse especially guttering, sort the pots and equipment ready for the spring. Outdoor plants pots put on stands / bricks so they don't get waterlogged. Mulch and prune fruit bushes to encourage a good crop. Keep leaves clear from new bulbs. Chit the early potatoes . Clear out dead and decaying materials. Prune fruit canes. Finally check, clean and maintain tools. I am sure you have more to add to the list. Time to potter and watch the daffodils and narcissi greenery appearHappy New Year All

National Overview. It was a generally unsettled month, dominated by low pressure. It was quite cold during the first week and more especially during the last week, when northerly winds blew frequently, but the middle fortnight was mild with predominantly south to south-westerly winds. The mean temperature for December was 0.5°C above the long-term average. Rainfall was 150% of average, and a few places had over twice the normal rainfall amount, but rainfall was near normal in some central southern parts. Sunshine was 98% of average, but anomalies varied widely.

In Eynsford we had 118mm (4.6") rain, in 15 days, which is 165% of average. We ended the year at 108% of average, which is similar to last year. We had a few very wet periods during the month, ending with dry, frosty weather and the wind from the north.
